Whenever I consider what has happened I keep returning to this word: evil. For a while on that day and during the days following most of the world was in shock. First there was disbelief, the kind of reaction we all have when someone dear to us dies unexpectedly. Then in horror we watched the towers fall again and again on television, we listened and read the personal reports in the news, and we wept.

Put your ear to the ground in this part of the world, and you can hear the thrumming, the deadly drumbeat of burgeoning anger, Please. Please, stop the war now. Enough people have died...And what of the rest of us, the numb recipients if this onslaught if what we know to be preposterous propaganda? ...Shall we look away and eat because we're hungry, shall we stare unblinkingly at the grim theatre unfolding in Afghanistan until we retch collectively and say, in one voice, that we have had enough?

As the first year of the new millennium rushes to a close one wonders - have we forfeited our right to dream? Will we ever again be able to re-imagine beauty?... without thinking of the World Trade Center and Afghanistan?

We wept again at the heroism, the bravery and goodness of firefighters, police officers, medical and service people who gave their lives for others.

All the world stood by in sympathy at America's loss and grief. The anger and the call for action was understood everywhere. But as the action against al Qa'ida and the Taliban enemies began to spill over into the destruction of innocent civilians in a devastated and

helpless country, the rest of the world and not a few in American began to recoil.

The president declared a war on terrorism and told the world it had to be "with us or against us". No middle ground. Terrorism, he said, is evil. Terrorists are evil, and whoever harbors terrorists are evil.

What is evil? Bush says al Oa'ida and the Taliban are evil. Bin Laden says Bush and America are evil. So both justify themselves in whatever they may do against evil. Did the terrorists start this war with the attacks on 9-11? Not in their thinking, or that of much of the Arab world. When American bombs kill half a million children and a million other innocent Iraqi people, Secretary of State Albright said it was a hard choice for the administration but "we think the

price is worth it". Others call that terrorism.

Muslims" in the region: bankers, professionals, businessmen with ties to the U.S. They expressed dismay and anger about U.S. support for harsh authoritarian states and the barriers that Washington places against independent development and political

democracy by its policies of "propping up oppressive regimes". The bin Laden network for 20 years has caused great harm to the poor and oppressed people of the region, who are not the concern of the terrorist networks. But they do draw from a reservoir of anger, fear, and desperation, and that is why they are praying for a violent US reaction, which will mobilize others to their horrendous cause. When America supports dictatorships that grow rich off their impoverished people, and supports Sharon's invasion and resettlement of Palestinian lands, most of the people in Arab countries are enraged. They call that evil.

We are born hopeful. Remember? We expect the best of this world when we come into it, and when that reasonable expectation is not met, we want to fix it then and there and make it right. As we know, when our natural joy and delight is rebuffed and we get hurt, we need a caring person who will listen to us and let us know we are wonderful and good, strong, intelligent, and completely loveable. When we don't have such a resource we get confused. At first we may struggle to change things on our own even under the oppressive educational systems. But eventually, after enough buffeting, we may lose hope in changing the world and settle for just surviving it.

And even those of us who keep up the good fight for world change in our various arenas sometimes get sunk in a fog of confusion and distress, feeling hopeless and paralyzed. We must keep

terrorism many more terrorists are created.

Let us question ourselves when we use the term evil. What do we mean by that? Does that help us understand what is really going on, or does it only mean we refuse to think about it. It's evil, he's evil, case closed.

If terrorism is violence against innocent people for political or ideological goals, then how do we suppose the world considers the actions of the US? Here are some of the incursions of the U.S., overtly or covertly, that fit the definition of terrorism: In 1954 the overthrow of the government of Guatemala which led to 40 years of hideous atrocities; in 1985 U.S. truck bomb terror in Beirut killed 80, wounded 260 mostly women and children; in 1986 organized a terrorist army in Nicaragua and was condemned by the World Court for unlawful use of

force - it then vetoed a Security Council resolution calling on all states to adhere to international law (the U.S dismissed the court judgement with contempt, becoming the only country

> condemned by that court for international terrorism); responding with an immediate escalation of the attack, in the 1990s the U.S. by supplying 80% of their arms supported the Turkey's crushing of their Kurdish

population in one of the worst ethnic cleansings of the 90s; and that at present the leading recipient of U.S. arms is Colombia, the worst human rights violator in the hemisphere.

Here is a list of countries with whom the U.S. was not at war which it bombed: in the 1950s, Guatemala, Indonesia, Cuba; in the 1960s Guatemala, Congo, Peru, Laos, Cambodia; in the 1980s Grenada, Libva, El Salvador, Panama; in the 1990s Sudan, Afghanistan, Yugoslavia. In how many of these instances did a democratic government, respectful of human rights, occur as a direct result? Not one. But the U.S. continued to support and uphold dictatorships in Indonesia, the Middle East, and Latin America. If Americans were more aware of its government's history they might not wonder why the U.S. is not admired and beloved everywhere.

Native Americans do not wonder so much.

For the American Indian there are many who sympathize with the plight of the U.S. attacked on its own soil, yet they don't forget how they were attacked in their own lands and, in history's greatest holocaust, slaughtered by the millions and subjugated to colonial powers. They cannot forget because racism continues and exploitation of Indian lands and resources by non-Indians goes on today with the collusion of those colonial governments. So - is America evil?

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Today we, in the United States, awoke as a fully participating member of the suffering human family. This morning we awoke to the realization that we were no longer separate from the war, devastation and hunger of the rest of the world that we previously had witnessed from our perspective as the world's most prosperous and powerful nation. From within the midst of the horror that we and the rest of the world witnessed yesterday is a potential, a blessing that awaits us if we have the courage to accept it. Instead of omnipotence, we have the opportunity to be humble; instead of invincibility, we have the opportunity to be vulnerable; instead of experiencing ourselves as separate, we can experience ourselves as connected...

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## **Visiting a Prison Circle**

It was a cold and snowy winter day in late February. The kind of day that made you wish you were staying right at home and keeping warm by the fire. I mentioned to Medicine Story my anxiety about driving all the way to Concord, which for us was a little over an hour, in conditions like these, but he reassured me. I also mentioned that I was having a bit of a nervous stomach as it was the first time I would attend a prison circle. Story again told me not to worry, that he would be right there beside me and everything was going to be just fine.

Medicine Story is a Native American Elder of the Wampanoag Tribe whom has been doing voluntary Prison Circle work for seventeen years. Attending and leading several prison circles a week in the New England area, this is a tremendous give-away as we Native people say. Medicine Story gives of himself. This is the true act of giving, and he is very committed. In coming to know Medicine Story, I am fascinated by the daily knowledge that flows from him so generously to others including myself. He is an artist, actor, author, playwright, musician, medicine man, storyteller, director, educator, lecturer, father, husband, brother, partner, and friend all rolled up in one being. He is a beloved gift to all whom he touches yet humble in his approach. I am thankful to have the chance to walk with him for a time. Every day with him is like a new adventure.

We arrived in Concord State Prison, effortlessly it appeared, since we chatted all the way the time flew right by and lo and behold we were entering the front door. There were a series of checkpoints to pass through with doors clicking time and again. We got to the main section to enter, and we had to deliver up our licenses to trade for visitor passes and also sign in and be checked out. Then we were delivered to guards who

> brought us down to the room we were to be attending. Here we were met by approximately a dozen men who had already been busy setting up the circle of chairs with openings at all four directions. A drum was over in the

corner with a few men drumming. We were approached by a man with a container of burning sage to be purified prior to entering circle. The men all gathered in the circle and took seats. One man handed Story a talking stick and had animal hair, beads and items that men had adorned while they were part of years gone by circles. I was sitting next to Story on his left. Story then opened the circle by giving a prayer of thanks to all our relations. Special thanks to Mother Earth and Father Sun for all they give us. I listened to the prayers some in Native tongue and then Story talked about Black Elk and stories of his life.

Native American Culture is not available for most incarcerated people. Having no access to this way of life leaves these people isolated from beliefs and customs that directly link to the person's rehabilitation, and a major source of emotional and spiritual stability. The talking stick went around and to hear these people's feelings of what this circle means to them and to listen to the exchange of gratitude to Medicine Story for coming sunk deep into my soul. The simple needs of these men to gather in circle and release themselves emotionally, discharging the pains of their pasts and concerns for the future.

A tear ran down my face. These men were not just hard-core criminals, without feelings, undeserving of access to their most *continued on page 10*

earth, and for the safety and healthy growth of our children.

To do that we need to come together more and more, and listen and open our hearts to each other. Not just to loved ones and friends, but to strangers and enemies. There is a reason Jesus exhorted us to love our enemies, even though Christians have managed to ignore that for two thousand years. When you love people you listen to them. You learn, you understand, you come closer. That listening and understanding and coming closer to each other is the greatest gift we can give of our precious time on this earth. To ourselves. To our children. To the world. To the future. @



## A Letter to President Bush: Free Leonard Peltier

Dear President Bush:

I am writing to urge you to grant immediate and unconditional clemency to Leonard Peltier. I am sure you are familiar with Mr. Peltier's 23-year struggle for justice, which has drawn the support of citizens, dignitaries and human rights organizations from all over the world, including Desmond Tutu, the European Parliament, and Amnesty International.

FBI misconduct in its prosecution of Mr. Peltier is well-documented. The FBI falsified evidence, coerced witnesses, and suppressed exculpatory evidence. US Prosecutor Lynn Crooks admits that the government has no case against Mr. Peltier, and would be unable to convict if a new, fair trial were granted.

Although the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals found the FBI's conduct abusive, Leonard Peltier has been denied a retrial. He has also been denied parole, despite his deteriorating health. He has waited six years for a review of his appeal for executive clemency, although such appeals are normally answered within nine months.

President Bush, this miscarriage of justice must end. Please use your authority to grant Leonard Peltier the justice he has so long been denied. (2)

Amnesty USA reports it needs our help to eliminate "death squads" operating under the guise of Guatemala's infamous Presidential General Staff - the Estado Mayor Presidencial (EMP). n 2001, two former EMP members were convicted of the 1998 extrajudicial execution of Catholic Bishop Juan Jose Gerardi. Another six former members, including high-ranking officers, are now under investigation for their roles in Bishop Gerardi's murder. The EMP is also implicated in the 1996 "disappearance" of Juan Jose Cabrera Rodas; the 1994 assassination of Judge Epaminondas Gonzalez Dubon; the 1990 assassination of Myrna Mack; and countless other cases of torture, "disappearance" and extrajudicial execution. Please email Guatemala's President Alfonso Portillo and urge him to dismantle the EMP now. @

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sacred way of life. I remembered back to my great grandparents on my father's side. Pure Cherokee's who had to give up five of their six children to white people to raise them as white to avoid the consequences of the color of their skin. My "wild savage" great grandparents then left for the mountains with their eldest son, never to be seen or heard from again. Some of the feelings of these men gathered in circle with me had the same torrid pasts.

I felt bonded and thankful to be a part of such a meaningful event that was taking place here.

The pipe ceremony signaled the near end of the circle, as the pipe was passed to each and everyone, traditionally starting with Medicine Story. I watched every movement and thoughtful expression of thanks to all relations. I observed how careful each individual was to perform the ceremony with respect for all. The circle was closed by Story, all of us holding hands to pray for peace, and the ending of violence. Collectively we gave thanks to the Great Creator and all our relations, for giving us all the ability to be there. Everyone thanked Medicine Story and myself, giving us a heartfelt farewell and an invitation back for me.

I will not ever forget my first Prison Circle visit. The Sacred Circle, the Ceremonies, Beliefs and Traditional Ways of my ancestors are an integral part of my life and who I am. It took this prison visit with these men, to show me how important and vital the rights I have to practice my ancestral ways of life truly are that, unfortunately I have taken for granted. It was not that long ago that this unalienable right was taken from my great grandparents. Medicine Story's prison missionary work is one of extreme importance, and I pray to the Great Mystery that more Native teachers and leaders continue to volunteer for such meaningful and rewarding experiences such as my first Prison Circle Visit.
